General Expectations

As you are mature members of the school, please take the time to help our younger students if they need it

As a year 12 student, you will be expected to behave responsibly and act as a role model to all the pupils on the site. Your behaviour in and around school should reflect your age and your position as senior students.

The sixth form team expect students to:

- work to the best of their ability in all subjects
- use independent study time effectively
- dress appropriately at all times
- attend school and lessons punctually, including registration
- actively encourage the younger pupils to be punctual for registration and lessons
- refrain from using mobile phones on the premises (except in the Sixth Form Centre)
- refrain from using music players whilst walking around the premises; please ensure that headphones are not visible
- behave in a calm and orderly fashion, being aware of the safety and well-being of others
- be actively involved in the wider school community
- not smoke cigarettes, consume alcohol, take drug or chew gum: all of these are prohibited. Moreover, you are not permitted to smoke at the end of the school drive

Dress Code

In the sixth form you will be expected to take a pride in your appearance by dressing appropriately and professionally for a day of study.

An acceptable standard of dress would be similar to clothes that you might wear for an interview, for work in a business environment, or when dealing with customers in the service industry.

BOYS

- may wear a suit, otherwise long, smart trousers, perhaps with a jacket: **NOT** jeans, cargo pants or tracksuit bottoms
- should wear a shirt with a collar and tie. During the summer term this will be reviewed. Please note that polo shirts are **NOT** acceptable
- should wear black or brown 'office' style shoes: **NO trainers** or canvas plimsolls are allowed
- should wear coats in colder weather
- be advised that jumpers should show your tie and shirt. Hoodies and sweaters are **NOT** appropriate attire.
- be advised that hats, gloves and coats must be removed for lessons and assemblies
- are not allowed to have nose or facial piercings, nor should any tattoos be visible
- are not allowed extremes of style or colour of hair: minimum is grade 1 and there must not be any tramlines or designs

GIRLS

- may wear a suit, otherwise wear smart trousers or knee-length skirts: **NOT** jeans, cargo pants or tracksuit bottoms
- should wear blouses or tops that are neat, tidy and demure, (no strappy tops) outfits must not be revealing or inappropriate for school
- should wear smart suitable shoes: **NO trainers**, canvas plimsolls, UGG boots or similar are allowed
- should wear coats in colder weather
- be advised that jumpers or cardigans should be smart. Hoodies and sweaters are **NOT** appropriate attire.
- be advised that hats, gloves and coats must be removed for lessons and assemblies
- should keep jewellery to a minimum; if in doubt, seek advice from your tutor
- are not allowed to have nose or facial piercings, nor should any tattoos be visible
- are not allowed extremes of style or colour of hair

If a student fails to adhere to the dress code they risk being sent home.

Attendance

All students are expected to attend registration, punctually, at 8.35 every morning.

Year 12 students are expected to be on site at all times during the school day. If a student is required to leave the premises for any reason, a note from home, giving reasons, must be handed to the Sixth Form Attendance Officer, Mrs Murray, in the resources room. Alternatively, parents or carers can opt to telephone Mrs Murray to give an explanation. Any student who needs to sign out during the school day must obtain verbal permission from Mr Hollyman or Miss Jones.

As year 12 students have study periods on their timetable, any medical appointment should be arranged for these times rather than during scheduled lessons. Students must always provide a note from home to your tutor and/or Mrs Murray requesting permission for an absence.

Parents and carers of students who are ill should phone Mrs Murray on the morning of absence with an explanation.

It is crucial that if you are leaving the premises for a pre-agreed reason that you sign in and out in the folder by the main doors of T-block.

GMS is responsible for your health and welfare whilst you are at school. If you leave the site without informing Mrs Murray and something happens to you, we will not know or be able to assist. If there is an emergency or fire drill and you have not signed out, it is a serious matter. If you are leaving the school site for any reason, you must seek permission and sign out in the folder.

Attendance should remain above 95% for all students in the sixth form. Sanctions will be put in place for those who fall below this level.

Parents will be notified if attendance levels are a concern. Students who persistently fail to attend morning registration and timetabled lessons will be asked to terminate their studies at the school.

You cannot learn and make progress if you are not present in lessons.

Bursary Award Information

Students and their parents/carers are invited to apply for a bursary award funding once they take up their place at Great Marlow School in September.

Each applicant will be required to present information and evidence, which will be assessed individually on a case by case basis and payments distributed accordingly.

The expectation is that the payments will be used to assist with: the cost of equipment needed for school; transport to and from school; examination re-sits; and school trips.

Application forms will be available in September and should be returned promptly with all supporting documents.

Payments are based on student attendance.

Social Education: Enrichment

Year 12 will attend a number of social education or enrichment sessions over the year.

The social education and enrichment modules are delivered in different ways depending on the topic. Sometimes visiting speakers, who are experts in their field, are invited in. Sexual health; driving safety; A-level transition skills; post-18 decisions; and being successful at studying independently are all examples of topics delivered by experts.

Skills acquired during these modules are essential to success. Any suggestions for future sessions are always gratefully received and should be passed on to Miss Jones.

The school offers the important opportunity to work alongside younger pupils to support them in their reading and achievement.

Once a week all sixth form students have a timetabled physical

education lesson. Please note, all students are expected to attend, unless they have a subject lesson scheduled at that time.

Well-Being: Mindset. Students will receive a programme tailored for Great Marlow School entitled "Mindset Success". This will focus on skills and techniques required by students for successful study patterns.


Senior Prefect Team

The Main Area

This room is provided for study and socialising. In this area you are to respect the property. Remember you are custodians for future generations of students. You are ultimately responsible for your conduct and should closely observe the following:

- No standing on any of the furniture
- No food or drink is to be consumed in this area
- Use the litter and paper recycling bins provided
- The Senior Prefect Team have the authority to request your expulsion from this area should you not observe the rules

The Silent Study Area

This area is for your independent study and should be used by you as often as possible. Once again, rules for this area must be observed:

- No eating
- No drinking
- No talking
- No music or headphones

Allow others to work in peace. The silent study area is for precisely that - please use the main area for socialising or study groups, and the café to eat or drink.

Once again, staff and the student leadership team reserve the right to request the exclusion of any student from this room if inappropriate behaviour occurs.

Mezzanine

This area has study tables and connection points for your own devices. This is a quiet study area, please observe these additional points:

- **Respect the fact that there are offices below.**
- **Ceiling levels are low at some points – please be aware.**
- **Do not lean over the metal side barriers, or climb on the bannister.**

Café

All food and drink should be consumed in here, as it is purpose-built for this activity. No food or drink should be taken from the café into the main area.

Snacks and lunch will be served here, as well as snacks and hot and cold drinks.



Student ID



All students in years 12 and 13 will be required to wear a purple lanyard bearing their names and photographs.

This is for essential site security and they should be worn at all times. Photos will be taken in the first week of the autumn term.

Careers, Information, Advice and Guidance is available to all 6th Form students. Year 12 or 13 students may arrange an interview with Gill Southon, our CIAG Advisor, at any time; simply ask your tutor to contact Mrs Chrominski, who will arrange a meeting time for you.

Form tutors, Mr Hollyman, Miss Jones, and Mrs Evans are also there to help and guide the learning and future plans of sixth formers.

Later in Year 12, students receive help and information on applying to higher education and pursuing a career. However, the more proactive students are about this throughout the year, the better!

Think now about what you wish to be doing in two years' time: university, an apprenticeship, or a job. Year 12 students will complete an 8 week programme at the start of the year to help focus them on **why** they are here.

In July, GMS organise a full day to allow students time to consolidate the information gathered in the Next Steps Booklet. This event is followed, in the evening, by a UCAS Parents' Information Evening.

Students are permitted three days' absence in Year 12 and Year 13 to visit universities around the country. Most university open days are in the summer term, so please be aware that this opportunity is available.

Student Progress and Reports

All sixth form students will be monitored on their academic progress on a half-termly basis.

This information is available for parents and carers to access via Emerge. All parents and carers are provided with a password to

Where necessary, some students will meet with Mr Hollyman, Miss Jones or Mrs Evans.

enable access to Emerge. If required, a paper copy can be sent home. All parents, carers and students are encouraged to access Emerge regularly, but at least every half-term when reports are issued. (See school calendar on www.gms.bucks.sch.uk).

Each half-term, students will be given a grade (A-E) that they are currently performing at, along with a fine-grading score of 1, 2 or 3. The number indicates how secure that grade is. For example, a B1 would indicate that a student is working at the top end of a B grade, possibly close to achieving an A grade; B3 would suggest that a student is working at the lower end of a B grade, close to a C:

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
The performance grade will be accompanied by a score of 1-4 (1 being the highest) for Attitude to Learning. A low Attitude to Learning score will be accompanied by one or two areas for development. The explanations for the areas for development codes are explained at the back of the student planners.

Year 12 students will meet with their form tutors to receive academic mentoring following each round of reports.

Student Impact Reports

Students who are identified as not achieving their target grade in a particular subject may be put onto a Student Impact Report (see example shown) until their achievement improves.

A target grade for each A-level subject will be generated based, partly, on your GCSE results and will be given to you by your subject teachers during the first half of the autumn term. However, as subject teachers log performance and progress, it is possible that an individual's target grade will be raised.


Praise postcards will be sent home, if a student is performing particularly well.

Independent Study

On Wednesday 5th September all year 12 students will take part in an Induction Assembly.

Year 12 have study periods. These are non-contact lessons and must be used constructively to ensure learning and progress takes place: they are not to be viewed as free time.

Independent study is an essential skill that has to be learnt in order to be successful at A-level and beyond. There is a difference between study at GCSE and AS. An independence of mind can only be achieved through reading and researching. Study lessons should be used for this, and to complete homework set by teachers.

For every four lessons of a subject in a week, a student is expected to complete two hours of independent study, during study periods or at home.

Students in Year 12, who understand the importance of effective independent study, make progress and achieve. Whilst GMS want students to enjoy their time in the sixth form, it is important to recognise that you have chosen to study here in order to gain a qualification.

On Wednesday 4th September, all year 12 students will take part in an Induction Assembly, where there will be a focus on Independent Study. They will leave at 11am. Thursday 5th September is a full day.

Car Parking

You may not schedule driving lessons at any time during the school day.

Many students will be fortunate enough to pass their driving tests in year 12 or 13 and may wish to drive to school. Unfortunately, there is not enough space for students to park on site. However, cars may be left in nearby roads provided they do not obstruct drive entrances or cause a nuisance to residents. Those who choose to park close to the school, please be aware that the road gets extremely busy at 3pm, and therefore the

earlier you can move your car, the better.

In **November**, all year 12 students attend a Safe Drive, Stay Alive presentation event at Wycombe Swan, which promotes safe driving.

Please do not park in the Britannia Pub car park.



Universities and UCAS

Many year 12 students like to understand the points score process used by university admissions tutors. Many wish to know how the points score equates to grades, and exactly what grades are needed to secure a place at a selected university. The information below provides an excellent starting point.

Please note, A-level subjects are linear and are examined at the end of year 13. Most universities now work on a points entry system. Below is a UCAS points conversion table:



However, permission for this must be sought from Mr Hollyman, and be accompanied by a note or phone call to Mrs Murray, and to your son/daughter's form tutor.
- A copy of your son or daughter's timetable will be sent home to you in September.
- If your son or daughter is absent from school, please phone Mrs Murray on the day of absence with an explanation.
- If notification is not given for an absence, please expect a phone call from Mrs Murray.
- Holidays should not be arranged during term time.
- Please make every effort to attend Year 12 Parents' Evenings.
