MESSAGE FROM THE HEADTEACHER

At the end of the first term of this academic year and as we approach the Christmas holidays, I would like to take this opportunity to thank all the parents/ carers that have sent positive emails, letters, and cards into Great Marlow School thanking the staff of the school for their work and support for our students and your children over the course of this term.

Education and particularly the recruitment of teachers and learning support staff has never been more challenging. At Great Marlow we are very fortunate that as a very good school with a strong reputation, recruitment for us is less challenging than for other schools but there is no doubt in our region and across the country there is a very real shortage of people wanting to work in schools. Therefore, I reiterate my thanks in my opening paragraph to the overwhelming majority of parents/carers who show their appreciation but most importantly communicate with the school in a respectful and appropriate way.

On this theme, I would like to say a public thank you to all of the members of Friends of Great Marlow (FoGMS) who not only organise events to raise money for the school but also events that bring different members of our school community together. An example of this most recently being the Christmas Wreath making session which led to over 40 parents making spectacular Christmas wreaths in the school canteen, whilst sipping mulled wine. Two members of FoGMS that deserve a particular mention are Jane Trainer and Suzy McGeachen who have been the leading lights for past few years, and I am very grateful to them for their efforts.

We are extremely fortunate at this school that the staff here, work with great endeavour and creativity to ensure that the school lives up to its stated ambitions to be a place where opportunities are created, potential is realised, and excellence is achieved. We are always striving to work, with increasing effectiveness, in partnership with our students, parents/carers, and the local and wider community. This is to achieve our vision of being the highest guality learning environment which inspires our students to be compassionate, successful, and resilient contributors to a better society. On the subject of community, we are very much looking forward to Marlow FM, after Christmas, establishing themselves in their new home at GMS.

'My Personal Best' is still a fundamental part of our

curriculum within the school focusing on the now 7 Rs, of Respect; Readiness; Reflection; Responsibility; Resourcefulness Resilience and now Reading. These skills are explicitly developed in students in all individual subjects and lessons as well as in our extensive extra-curricular programme. Last year the 7th R of Reading has been introduced very successfully and is positively impacting on all children's vocabulary and use of language both verbally and written, which will only enhance their performance in all subjects and activities across the school.

I am sure that you will have read the coverage in the media on children's attendance to school since the pandemic. Whilst the attendance of students to GMS has always been very good, as a percentage (%) our whole school attendance figure is better than the national figure. Unfortunately, like the national attendance % figure, GMS's % attendance is down on the pre-pandemic level. It is and will always be true that for students to achieve their full potential attendance to school is vital. We will continue to work hard with parents/ carers and students to maximise attendance to GMS. Last years, GCSE results are a very strong reminder about the impact of attendance on achievement, students with 98% or above attendance to school in Year 11, achieved results that were one and a quarter grade better on average across all their subjects than students with less than 90% attendance. This analysis took into account each individual student's starting points in Year 7 and therefore is about progress not attainment, although the attainment of these students was significantly better as well.

That fact leads me nicely into although the Christmas holidays are a time for celebration, as well as relaxation and spending time with family and friends, our senior students in Year 11 and Year 13 should

have a revision programme in place over this period. The programme needs

balance their need for a break with consolidating the learning and understanding across their different subject areas, ready for the 'mock' exams which start on Monday 16th January. Good quality revision and preparation does not guarantee great results, but it does significantly increase the likelihood!

In my Celebration of Success speech at the end of the last academic year l said, that in the 2022/2023 school year GMS had run more educational trips, visits and activities than ever before. This first term of 2023/2024 has put us on course for more even more this year. 



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

Our students have learnt the anatomy of the face, explored their own eyes,



Over the course of 6 weeks in the Autumn term, our students collected over 1600 plastic bottles as part of a recycling drive to repurpose single-use plastic. 



We wish her all the best as she prepares for the next gymnastic performance.


SILVER MEDAL FOR JUDO

PROGRESS REPORTS


The first set of Year 11 progress reports were published at the end of October, and I am incredibly proud of the cohort's achievements on these.



Since 2019, GMS have become a force to be reckoned with when it comes to indoor hockey and are arguably the most consistent school with regards to results and performances. In the last 3 years, they are the only school to reach the regional final on all three occasions, so have been 'the team to beat' in recent tournaments. This year was no different, where the girls, once again, made it through to the South Central final.

The team started the tournament in style with a comprehensive 5-2 win over Pangbourne, who were determined for revenge after last year's U18 national cup semi-final defeat to GMS. It didn't take long for GMS to snuff out any glimmer of hope Pangbourne might have had when Lena Sykora put GMS ahead in the first 5 minutes after she showed great composure to round the keeper and slot the ball home. Lena followed up with two more to





make her hattrick, and along with Rachel Clarke's brace, Pangbourne's two goals didn't give GMS too much to worry about.

A tougher test was to come in the next game where the team faced Peter Symonds, who the squad had beaten in last year's semi-final. As it turned out, the game didn't turn out to be tougher at all, as the girls eased past PCS with another 5-2 win. Mabel Daw and Colette Fitzpatrick found their way onto the score sheet after two well-worked penalty corners. Lena and Rachel scored the other three goals between them to take both of their tallies for the day up to 4. Peter Symonds did manage to gain two late consolation goals, but the win was never in doubt as GMS dominated possession and saw out the game with a mature and unflustered performance. The final group game against Bloxham, became a formality, with all of the squad playing their part in yet another 5-2 win.

It was semi-final time, and as seemed to be customary at regional indoor finals, a local derby between GMS and SWB was in order. Never a nice fixture for either side, due to having to play against club teammates, this was always going to be a fixture with a huge psychological element to it. With GMS snatching defeat from the jaws of victory last year, losing the final via a penalty shoot-out, they were clearly nervous, yet determined to right the wrongs of last year. There was a glint in the girls' eyes that clearly stated, "we are not losing this". There was never any doubt going into that semi-final game, that the team wanted to win their title back of best team in Marlow.

As expected, the first half was tight, and although GMS had the better of the possession, they did find themselves behind early on. Nevertheless, the girls have come a long way mentally since last year, and they remained unphased and stuck to their processes, to level the score going into half time. The second half was a different story, with GMS finding their form of earlier in the tournament, to score 3 unanswered goals. SWB pulled their keeper off in a lastditch attempt to win the game, but GMS held firm to, once again, claim a 5-2 victory and march on to the final.


These girls have been in spitting distance of the national final on two occasions before, so are no strangers to disappointment. Last year a penalty shoot-out prevented the girls' qualification, and the year before when this group were U16, a goal difference of two was the difference between qualification and heartbreak. This year, the national final proved to be a step too far once again for this

talented group of players. This year's final was to be played against Wellington College, who had clearly put their scholarship money to good use and recruited some useful additions to their squad since they were U16. It would be a tough test, and a half time score of 2-2, proved how close it was. Unfortunately, with 5 minutes to go, Wellington scored, so GMS had no choice to pull the keeper to attempt to push for an equaliser. The girls had a number of chances, but luck just wasn't on their side, with Wellington taking advantage of Marlow's empty net, scoring two counter attacks against the run of play. The game ended with another 5-2 result, but unfortunately this time, GMS were on the wrong side of it.

For the third time in three years, the girls finished as Regional Indoor runners up. Sport is cruel sometimes, and this group know that more than most, but it can teach some important life lessons. Not everything in life comes easy, and you must work incredibly hard to achieve success, and even then, success is not guaranteed. It was amazing to hear that some of last year's U18 squad were checking in with the team's progress throughout the day. It demonstrates that the hockey family we are building, continues even once the students have left GMS. Once a GMS hockey player, always a GMS hockey player.

I am incredibly proud of how the team conducted themselves throughout the day, and indeed every day since. They demonstrated carefree fun between games, but absolute focus during games, and constant sportsmanship. They were gracious in victory and defeat. Since then, as they did last year, the girls have thrown all their frustration and upset into their club indoor hockey, successfully qualifying the club National Finals for the third year running. 


